#### 1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained
<p>Students : The system used for feedback collection for students allows no scope for undue influence being exercised on the students. Teachers teaching a particular batch do not collect the feedback forms from that batch. Further, the sorting of the forms once collected is undertaken by a neutral body, namely the Examination Department. A few core indicators from the feedback form are given a lot of emphasis. In view of current demand for diverse subjects , number of optional papers are offered . Faculty: NLUO has long adopted a practice of systematically undertaking curriculum development review processes. At the end of every semester, a curriculum review meeting (course outline presentation) is organised. In the course of this, each faculty member is required to make a presentation on how s/he has incorporated alterations, modifications, and revisions to the course. Other faculty members are also encouraged to participate and offer their suggestions and critical comments. Emphasis is placed on how the faculty member has undertaken to update the course and its modules by incorporating recent case laws, and contemporary</p>

global developments. NLU, Odisha has started the Wednesday Faculty Seminar series for deliberations on various contemporary legal issues. Faculty members in the academic year 2018-19 were encouraged to incorporate within their syllabi topics that are considered directly and tangibly beneficial to students preparing for competitive examinations, including various civil services and state judiciary examinations. Faculty members were required to clearly highlight these aspects in the course of their presentations Alumni: NLUO has now formally established an Alumni Association. This Association undertakes several alumni outreach programmes, of which the flagship event is called Alumni Connect. During Alumni Connect and other such programmes, constant feedback is taken from alumni to bring the curriculum at par with market requirements. Specifically, their opinions on core academic aspects is taken most seriously in regard to examination pattern, the nature of courses the kind of optional courses that are likely to be beneficial for graduates' careers, and so forth. It has been observed that most alumni concur that NLUO's foundational courses have contributed immensely to strengthening their fundamentals, and honing their transactional skills. Employers: The University secures feedback and other insights from potential employers who visit the University on various occasions such as guest lectures, seminars, workshops, student interaction sessions. In particular, the University actively invites feedback on their expectations from fresh graduates. Such feedback is sought from a variety of sources, including the management of corporate houses, senior staff of law firms, senior management of public sector organisations, practising lawyers, judges. Parents: The University endeavours to remain in constant touch with parents. Usually this is undertaken through the hostel administration. Regular updates on wards' performance are sent to parents through e-mails. For long parents have requested that facilities be provided in regard to students' mental health issues. In response, the University has instituted regular online and offline counselling sessions.

The University along with YourDost, platform for providing counselling for mental and emotional wellbeing, on 19th November 2018, conducted a workshop on 'Stress Management' for the Administrative staff. The session aimed at equipping the staff with ways to

The University organised a YourDost session on Barefoot Counseling for Security staff and House-keeping staff on 18th January, 2019: The session was aimed at including the security staff and the house-keeping staff in the welfare ecosystem in the campus. i) Energy Conservation: NLUO has taken few measures to save more energy as the campus is under development and it has number of plans which will be implemented in due course of time. a) We have executed an automatic mechanism for light system of Street Light, Lights in the Landscaping area etc. b) We have preferred the execution of CFL / LED lights instead of the traditional lighting equipments. c) All the buildings are well lighted with the day-light because of the Open-to-Sky (OTS) areas. The Academic Block, Administrative Block and the Hostels are well planned with such an Energy saving architect. d) The air-conditioning system in the Academic Administrative Blocks are centralised but each outlet units have individual remotes to control. ii) Use of Renewable Energy: The Government of Odisha has installed solar panels in free areas of the university. The solar panel outlets are installed at top of the Administrative Building, Academic Building, Boys Hostel - I, Boys Hostel - II, Girls Hostel and Parking Lots. These panels shall be on lease for the duration of twenty five years. The solar panels will have the capacity of 250 KW and the electricity produces will be directly given to the grid. However the government will reduce the amount of electricity bill equivalent to the electricity produced through the solar panels installed in the university. The solar panels are already installed in the campus but the same is required to be started by the government. iii) Water Harvesting: For water Harvesting, NLUO has made some endeavours and more in the plan as the construction of the campus is going on. Sewage Treatment Plant a) The university has constructed two Sewage Treatment Plants for recycling the Sewerage Water. These Sewerage Treatment Plants (STP) are attached to the Hostels and other buildings of the University. The water recycled from these plants is used in irrigation / watering the plants. b) There are provisions for recharge wells to store rain/flood water and to use the same in plantation areas etc. iv) Efforts of Carbon Neutrality: The basic and the major step to neutralise the Carbon / CO<sub>2</sub> is plantation, the University has made its campus green by planting different genre of trees with the help of State / District Forest Departments,

Horticulture Department. In addition to this the surrounding of the University also has many well-groomed trees. v) Plantation: As mentioned above, we are emphasising upon making the campus as much green as possible and almost 60 of the area is kept for plantations / making lawns. vi) Hazardous Waste Management: We have Sewerage Treatment plants to dispose the sewage wastes and recycle the water to be used for irrigational purposes. Along with the same, the Cuttack Municipal Corporation also co-operates in taking away other waste including Solid Wastes.
